Things to know about the Local Engagement requirement:

- The Local Engagement requirement falls under the Self and the World category of the new general education curriculum.
 - Local engagement (LE) provides opportunities for students to impact the quality of life in a community positively and to better understand and apply academic knowledge and proficiencies to active and ethical participation in civic life.
- The Local Engagement requirement of the General Education curriculum has the following three parts
 - 1. Completion of the preparatory module during the spring semester First-Year Foundations course
 - 2. Completion of the "semester-long" local engagement experience (this is not limited to just the parts working with community partners but also includes the related training and/or coursework)
 - 3. Submission of the two-part portfolio contribution (documentation and a critical reflection project)
- Please do not ever refer to it as a "service requirement." The goal of including this requirement in the general education curriculum is ensure that all students have a high impact experiential learning opportunity that allows them to apply what they are learning in classes through mutually beneficial partnerships with an organization. Students will demonstrate their ability to meet the following learning outcomes:
 - Work collaboratively in local cultural settings
 - Engage in citizenship through respectful interactions
 - Articulate how local engagement fosters individual and collective wellbeing
- Local does not necessarily mean Huntingdon, PA. Local means highly contextualized, place-based learning that will be unique to the location and the community. Some students may fill the requirement while abroad. For example – The Cultural Learning Tour course to the Dominican Republic is a CEL designated course.
- Students will have choices. Using the Stanford Pathways framework (below) the goal is to make sure students identify LE learning opportunities that align with their talents, interests and values.



- Possibilities for meeting the LE requirement include:
 - A variety of CEL-designated courses across many departments (Group Communication, IMA, Language in Motion)
 - Approved internships
 - Shepherd Higher Education Consortium on Poverty Internship
 - Student teaching
 - Juniata's Leadership Program
 - Newman Civic Fellowship
 - o Publicly engaged scholarship/research projects
 - Approved leadership roles in clubs/student organizations that engage with community through one of the pathways
